REFLECTION ON THE READINGS from Revd Philip

A number of years ago my Saturday paper featured a regular short column with the title 'Frantic Semantics'. To simplify a complex subject, semantics is the study of the meaning of words, and the writer of Frantic Semantics looked at the way the meaning of many of the words in regular use today have changed over the years. Sometimes the passing years have changed their meaning entirely, and the Prayer Book Society have felt the need to produce a short guide to the language of the Book of Common Prayer for those unfamiliar with it. I remember as a child singing the hymn, 'Jesus shall reign where're the sun', and being intrigued by the line, 'let every creature rise and bring peculiar honours to our king'. I tried to imagine what those peculiar honours might be, because from its original meaning as something special, in modern usage the word peculiar often means strange or bizarre. And let us not stray too far into the subject of royal peculiars which sadly are not the strange habits of kings and gueens but describe a parish or church exempt from the jurisdiction of the diocese in which it lies, but is subject to the direct jurisdiction of the monarch. Someone I know was recently married in the Chapel of St Mary Undercroft in the Palace of Westminster which is one such royal peculiar.

In our Gospel reading this morning Jesus responded to a question about which is the greatest commandment by citing two, thus giving us an early example of BOGOF, buy one get one free. I recite a version of this, what we describe as the Summary of the Law, at every service of Holy Communion. "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." ³⁸This is the greatest and first commandment. ³⁹And a second is like it: "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." Love is central to both commandments, but what do we understand the word Love to mean today, a word so important Jesus claimed that on it, 'hang all the law and the prophets'? I remember one of my interviewers at the residential selection conference I attended asking me what the most important thing was I wanted people to know. My reply was that I wanted them to know that God loves them, and I hope that over the past 14 years since my ordination I have kept to that ideal.

What, however, does the word love mean, how is it used today? When I tell people that God loves them what do they understand by that? And perhaps just as importantly, how are we to express that love to others, because love is not a gift that we are given so that we can bank it and keep it for our own benefit. Today the word love is used in many different ways. We love many things, chocolate, football, fishing, going on holiday. On Monday my paper listed the top10 things which a survey had revealed people love to do. At the top of the list was walking, followed by reading, eating out, watching films, gardening, travelling, cooking, doing puzzles, socialising and last of all, baking. All these activities have to do with feelings and the enjoyment we derive from doing them. However, this use of the word love is far removed from the meaning Jesus gave it, for him to love God and to love neighbour was set withing the context of a commandment. You 'shall' love. That removes love from being a warm fuzzy feeling we get when we do things we enjoy, to something that needs commitment and dedication. We 'shall' love God both in the good times

when everything in the garden is rosy, and in the bad times when life is not easy, when there is pain and the future uncertain. Equally, we 'shall' love our neighbours, have their best interests at heart, even if we dislike them and our human instincts tell us to run a mile from them.

In her commentary on this imperative to love, the writer Debie Thomas says she does not think it's a coincidence or a mistake that Jesus inextricably links love of God with love of neighbor. Each reinforces, reinterprets, and revives the other. As heirs of the Incarnation, we *cannot* love God while we refuse to love what God loves. We cannot love God in a disinfected, disembodied way that doesn't touch the dirt and depth of this world. Our love is meant to be robust and muscular, hands-on and intimate.

If we are to take anything away from our reading this morning it is an invitation to reflect on how we understand love, and both love God and our neighbour as ourselves with integrity. May God who loved the world so much that he sent his only Son to be our Saviour, the ultimate expression of love, give us his grace and enable us to do so.
