- ²³ When he entered the temple, the chief priests and the elders of the people came to him as he was teaching, and said, 'By what authority are you doing these things, and who gave you this authority?'

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REFLECTION ON THE READINGS Chris Stanisstreet

Jesus had upset the Pharisees in so many ways by challenging their actions and authority and in so doing was a target for their aunts. In asking Jesus where his authority had come from they were trying to catch him out because if he had said he was the son of God they would have immediately arrested him for blasphemy and Jesus could not allow that to happen as his work on earth had not yet been completed.

So Jesus counters the question with his own which placed them in a dilemma. If the Jewish authorities had said that the ministry of John the Baptist was from God they would have to accept that Jesus was the Messiah because John had publicly said so. If they said John's ministry was not from God, they would have angered the many people who were convinced that John was a messenger from God.

By saying they did not know they embarrassed themselves because in being members of the Sanhedrin they were expected to be able to distinguish between true and false prophets.

They responded out of expediency, thinking about what it was safe to say rather than what was the truth. This may also apply to all of us when in similar situations, when we think about what it is safe to say rather than speaking the truth. However, as Christians if we know the truth we should speak it.

We may of course feel that there are some grey areas such as when someone asks us what we think about their new hairstyle, which was actually think doesn't suit them at all but choose to say 'lovely' in order not to hurt their feelings, but at the end of the day telling the truth, in as kind a way as possible, is what is important.

The Jewish leaders - scribes and Pharisees, are the people who said they would follow and obey God but then did not do so. On the other hand, the tax collectors and prostitutes were the people who were going their own way and who then chose to take God's way.

In this situation, no-one is really being praised. What we have is two imperfect sets of people, one set being better than the other. Neither son in the parable was the kind of son to bring great joy to his father. Both were unsatisfactory but the one who eventually obeyed was clearly better than the other. An ideal son would have accepted his father's orders and then have shown his respect by obediently carrying them out with good grace.

In our world there are two classes of people.

Firstly there are those who promise the earth but then do not deliver on the promises – somewhat reminiscent of some politicians prior to an election.

Secondly there are those who practice is far better than their lack of promises. They claim to have no interest in religion and the church yet live more Christian lives than many people hwo profess to be Christians. I'm sure that we have all encountered such people.

One such friend of mine often visits people in hospital and always phones or visits to take a plant or bunch of flowers to someone who is lonely or going through a hard time, yet would not want any involvement with religion and the church.

The second class of people is preferable to the first class, yet neither is perfect. The really good person is the one in whom their professed beliefs and their practice match.

The school motto on blazers and documents where I last taught was: 'facta non verba', Latin for 'acts not words', in other words, actions speak louder than words.

In our parable the first son, who agreed to go showed respect and courtesy towards his father - even calling him 'sir'. But courtesy that never gets beyond words is a falsity. True courtesy is obedience, willingly given and of course, we should always be mindful that good deeds should be carried out graciously - 'it isn't what we say or do but how we say or do it that matters.'

As Paul said to the Philippians: "God is at work in us enabling us to will and work for his good pleasure."

So this week, are we all ready to say yes to God through our actions, to be obediently, willingly and graciously carried?

PRAYER in the coming week:

Monday – pray that as the country faces another six months of restrictions, we would all be able to do our part in following the rules and to do so with resilience. Pray that we would demonstrate our Christianity to those around us by asking ourselves "What would Jesus do?" whenever we are in doubt about how to act.

Tuesday – pray for all those who have suffered from loneliness over the last six months as they fear what the next restrictions will bring. Pray that we will be especially alert to those around us who are isolating at home and need our help, whether this is by providing a practical service or simply listening on the phone.

Wednesday – pray for all in physical or financial need at this time, especially those who have lost their jobs or who work in sectors not yet able to return to work; many individuals who struggled over the last six months are now facing many more months of uncertainty. Also, many local businesses are still trying to get back on their feet after the lockdown and need our support to keep going.

Thursday – pray for the organisations and charities who try to help people by providing the support or resources they need to survive, such as mental health services, food banks and homelessness charities. Many of these have been struggling to support many additional people on reduced incomes and rely on financial gifts from the public to keep going.

Friday – pray for all with health needs at this time. Pray that as hospitals again need to focus on the effects of the pandemic, that all who work in the Health Service would have the energy they need and not be overwhelmed. Pray for those who have had treatment delayed from the Spring that they would be able to get the treatment they need, that cancer treatments will be able to go ahead and that all will be able to seek health support safely.

Saturday – pray for wisdom for all those advising and making decisions about health and necessary restrictions (such as those contributing to the Scientific Advisory Group for Emergencies, Public Health England etc and the Government). Pray also for all those involved in the development of vaccines and treatments.
