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### **REFLECTION ON THE READINGS** by Revd Philip

For me, Easter Sunday begins early, before the sunrises, as I light a fire at the back of St Mary's Church overlooking the mere. As I stand in the pre-dawn light with the smoke of the fire drifting past and listen to the dawn chorus, there is the opportunity to compose my thoughts and savour a few moments of tranquillity before people arrive for our sunrise service. We light the Paschal candle from the fire and carry it into church for our first service of Holy Communion. Then the flame will be carried by various means to our other churches and used to light their paschal candles.

In our reading, one of the accounts in the Gospels of what happened that first Easter morning, Mark describes another pre-dawn gathering as Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James and Salome brought sweet spices to anoint the body of Jesus. They came to complete the task that Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus had hurriedly begun as they had rushed to make sure that Jesus was buried before the start of the Passover. We know that Jesus has been raised from death to life, but as far as his followers were concerned, when they woke that first Easter morning nothing had changed. Jesus, their leader, companion and friend had been wrenched from them and executed as a common criminal. The gloom of the early morning must have reflected the deep darkness, grief, disappointment and despair that they were experiencing. Jesus' ministry that until a few days ago had been so amazingly successful had suddenly and unexpectedly ended in failure – or so it seemed. Now these three women came to do all that they could in the circumstances, and we might surmise that they came in the early morning before too many people were about to ask questions.

It is well understood that people in the first throes of grief do not always think rationally. We see an example of this in the mission of the three women that first Easter morning. They knew that the entrance to the tomb would be blocked by a large and heavy stone, and to gain access to Jesus body it would have to be moved. It would be far too heavy for them, yet they appear to have made no preparations, no arrangements for men presumably, to move it for them, and then roll it back into place when they had finished. Perhaps they thought they might meet people who would help them. Perhaps as they made their way to the tomb they had not even considered the possibility that they might not be able to do for Jesus as they intended.

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Reaching the tomb, however, they found that the stone had already been rolled away. Going inside they encountered a young man sitting on one side, but no Jesus. They were understandably terrified, and the words of the young man probably confused them even more. Be not affrighted. In those three words we have a significant clue that the one speaking to them was in fact an angel. Throughout the scriptures the first thing an angel says when he meets someone is, 'Do not be alarmed', or in other translations, 'Do not be afraid'.. Gabriel says those words to Mary at the Annunciation, to Joseph when he discovers Mary is pregnant, to the shepherds as they watch their flocks by night. Do not be afraid. In fact the words of the angel that followed were so improbable given what they had witnessed a couple of days earlier that they ran from the tomb in fear. This was not how they had expected their morning to end. They had steeled themselves to handle a body, now there was no body and an amazing, unbelievable statement that Jesus had risen. The account in Mark proclaims the resurrection, but leaves his readers without an account of the risen Jesus. Because of that some people prefer the accounts in the other gospels, particularly that of John with his description of Mary Magdalene mistaking Jesus for a gardener, and being commissioned to tell the others the news. The headlong dash of Peter and the other disciple to see if what they had been told was true. The vivid description of the folded graveclothes.

By comparison, the account of Mark seems unsatisfactory and leaves us waiting until next Sunday to tie up the loose ends. Yet perhaps Mark fits well with our celebration of Easter this year. Last year even I was forbidden to enter our four churches, let alone our congregations. The best we could do was a service filmed in the dining room at the vicarage. This year we are allowed to celebrate in church, but socially distanced, wearing masks, and with no singing. We say our Alleluias, proclaim the Christ is risen, he is risen indeed and hear that through his resurrection Christ has conquered death, and all this in the face of the pain and loss of over 127,000 deaths through Covid in this country and getting on for 3,000,000 worldwide. So perhaps Marks account that begins with three women grieving the loss of a man they love, and ends with fear and bewilderment is the appropriate one this Sunday. It can remind us of our own struggles to comprehend what can only be truly described as a mystery and the dangers of giving glib answers for the problems of suffering and death. Mark's account illustrates the gap between the resurrection of Jesus and all that it means for me, and my ability to apprehend it fully. In her book, Revelations of Divine Love, Julian of Norwich wrote of hearing Jesus say to her, 'All shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of thing shall be well.' That sums up for me the promise of the resurrection. Christ has risen, the tomb is empty, the power of death to lock us into an impenetrable night has been destroyed. Love has conquered. All will be well. Whether we can fully comprehend it or not, that is God's gift to us this Easter.

Hear again the words of the angel.

Do not be alarmed: you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified: he has been raised; he is not here: Look, there is the place they laid him.

<sup>3</sup> *Full of honour and majesty is his work, and his righteousness endures for ever.*

Today, think of all God’s works such as those recorded in the Bible and what we see in nature, in the people around us and in our own lives. There is so much we have to be thankful for and so let us praise Him and give thanks “with our whole hearts”.

Tuesday: (Psalm 112)

<sup>6</sup> *For the righteous will never be moved; they will be remembered for ever.*

<sup>7</sup> *They are not afraid of evil tidings; their hearts are firm, secure in the LORD.*

There are so many scary things we have to face in this life; we are encouraged not to be afraid, but to rely on God. If we are righteous (morally correct), we should take the things we fear to Him and then we can rest secure with steady hearts while we face them. Pray to God about the things you need to face this week.

Wednesday: (Psalm 113)

<sup>5</sup> *Who is like the LORD our God, who is seated on high,*

<sup>6</sup> *who looks far down on the heavens and the earth?*

<sup>7</sup> *He raises the poor from the dust, and lifts the needy from the ash heap,*

<sup>8</sup> *to make them sit with princes, with the princes of his people.*

Our God is beyond the Universe, but he still sees what goes on and He cares about the injustices and those in need. Today let us pray that he would open our eyes to see those things around us that we can help to change and give us the desire to help those in need.

Thursday: (Psalm 114)

<sup>5</sup> *Why is it, O sea, that you flee? O Jordan, that you turn back?*

<sup>6</sup> *O mountains, that you skip like rams? O hills, like lambs?*

<sup>7</sup> *Tremble, O earth, at the presence of the LORD, at the presence of the God of Jacob,*

<sup>8</sup> *who turns the rock into a pool of water, the flint into a spring of water.*

When the Israelites fled from Egypt, they experienced some of God’s power, but forgot it when they were engrossed in self-pity. We need to pray that we will not forget that we have an all-powerful God, for whom nothing is impossible, and ask for help to trust Him with all the situations and people we face. He is Lord of all!

Friday: (Psalm 115)

<sup>11</sup> *You who fear the LORD, trust in the LORD! He is their help and their shield.*

<sup>12</sup> *The LORD has been mindful of us; he will bless us;*

<sup>15</sup> *May you be blessed by the LORD, who made heaven and earth.*

<sup>16</sup> *The heavens are the LORD’s heavens, but the earth he has given to human beings.*



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We are given a command to “Trust in the Lord”, but that doesn’t mean we should just leave everything to Him to deal with. Vs16 says that He has given the Earth to humans and so we need to step up and take responsibility for what humans are doing to the Earth. Today, pray about what steps we can take individually to protect the Earth and help to correct the damage already done by people.

Saturday: (*Psalm 116*)

<sup>1</sup> *I love the LORD, because he has heard my voice and my supplications.*

<sup>2</sup> *Because he inclined his ear to me, therefore I will call on him as long as I live.*

<sup>12</sup> *What shall I return to the LORD for all his bounty to me?*

<sup>13</sup> *I will lift up the cup of salvation and call on the name of the LORD,*

God has given us so much and we owe him everything; our response can only be to love Him as our Lord and our God! Today pray the words of Vs12; the KJV says “What shall I render unto the LORD for all his benefits toward me?” There may be an answer!

### **Prayer for April:**

Thank you, Lord, for Springtime with its message of hope as the world emerges from the starkness of winter. This year especially may we be aware of the awakening from the dark and cold of the past season, but also may we be conscious of the warmth of your love as we emerge from lockdown. Help us to move forward with hope in the warmth of your love. Amen.
